

Bernhard Vogel 24th October - 11th November



Picture in your mind's eye a watercolour painting of San Gimignano in Tuscany. Yes, San Gimignano – the hilltop village in the heart of Italy's 'Chiantishire'. The UNESCO World Heritage site. You're seeing something impossibly pretty. Maybe even a little twee.

Well, prepare for a shock. San Gimignano features in Berhnard Vogel's new collection for the Catto. Twee it is not. The painting depicts the village's famous medieval towers under siege. From below the antagonist is the voracious hillside, a raging swirl of angry greens decorated with chaotic blobs and lines. From above looms the oppressive sky, bearing down in ominous inky blues.

It's such a dramatic interpretation of what could otherwise be a clichéd scene. But that's Bernhard. He sees things differently. This, of course, is what we expect from the very best artists. We want a new way of looking at the familiar. We want to be prodded and jolted. The new show more than delivers.

Here's another example: Santa Maria Salute. Venice's Baroque masterpiece is another frequently depicted landmark, but Bernhard re-frames it entirely. His loose dancing brushwork gives the basilica a jarring instability. He throws in streaks of strange Halloween orange that look like fire. Bernhard makes the church appear as if it's about to go into orbit.

The show is bursting with these eye-popping visions of otherwise familiar places; Trafalgar Square, Isle De Paris, St Katherines Dock, 5th Avenue and more. Time and again, Bernhard dispenses with 'correct' colour, chooses vertiginous aerial viewpoints and throws in bits of newsprint or cardboard – whatever achieves the desired effect.

This signature approach has propelled Bernhard's professional career since the early 1980s. Bernhard was born in Salzburg in 1961 and showed early promise as an artist. But he preferred sports. However, a motorcycle accident at the age of 23 forced him into a re-think. He began experimenting in watercolour, which reignited his passion for art. "I tried everything, and realised my painting could convey drama, mystery and secrets," he remembers.

Soon after, Bernhard's professional career began. He was part of the 1985 Salzburg Summer Academy, and had hosted his first London exhibition by 1990. Today, he exhibits in the major cities of the world and has collectors in every continent. He is one of the Catto's best loved and most established artists. This new collection shows why.








Aviary Rooftop view, London, $90 \times 120 \text{cm}$, Mixed Media




